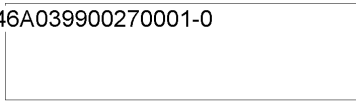

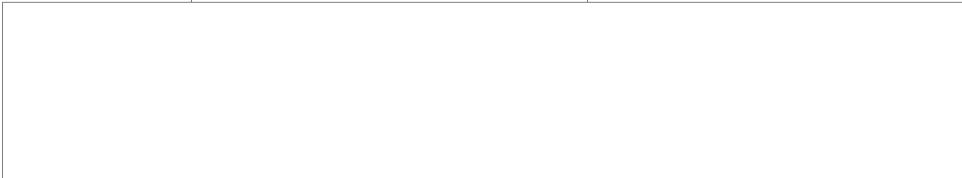

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1. Installations of the uranium open mines, located south of Kowary Gorne (N 50-48, E 15-50), were partly visible from the highway and from the railway line which ran from Jelenia Gora (N 50-54, E 15-44) to Kamienna Gora (N 50-47, E 16-02). The only completely visible part of the installation was an administrative compound which consisted of five or six one-story wooden barracks used as workshops, garages, and administrative offices. The compound was occupied by Soviet soldiers until fall 1956; it was enclosed with barbed wire and posted with armed guards.

2. [redacted] the mining enterprise in Kowary employed about 600 civilian workers and a small Polish military labor unit. [redacted]

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[redacted] a labor platoon returning from work [redacted]

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[redacted] individual soldiers in Kowary Gorne and Kowary Srednie. [redacted]

[redacted] the civilian workers were brought to and from work by trucks from neighboring villages and towns as far away as Kamienna Gora and Jelenia Gora; some workers also came by trains. [redacted]

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[redacted] columns of about seven four-ton trucks passing from Kowary to Jelenia Gora in the evenings. [redacted] such transportation could be observed almost every evening. These trucks were driven and guarded by armed Soviet soldiers.

3. [redacted] exactly what was produced in the mines [redacted]

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it was locally known as uranium. [redacted] huge amounts of earth and rocks dumped outside the open mines. [redacted] some sort of processing of uranium ores was carried out in Ogorzelec (Dittersbach) (N 50-47, E 15-54) [redacted]

4. [redacted] the Soviets had left in fall 1956 and that the exploitation of uranium mines was continuing under Polish management, but on a rather smaller scale. [redacted]

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
